

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



#### Farewell Maree, our Top Girl for the last seven years

Our visionary and innovative College Principal Dr Maree Herrett retired at the end of 2019 after a stellar career transforming Santa Sabina College into NSW's top Catholic school.

Looking back on her life and times at Santa, we pay tribute to her brilliance and stamina and document the wonderful improvements she has made.

When Dr Herrett was our Coordinator of Senior English her students not only topped the state in English Advanced, English Extension 1 and English Extension 2 but they also studied the 1982 English play *Top Girls*. Controversial, racy but above all, feminist, the choice of Caryl Churchill's play from the new HSC syllabus raised a few eyebrows at the time. Responding to the concern, Principal Sr Judy Lawson OP requested to read a copy. After doing so she endorsed Dr Herrett's choice – an edgy yet government authorised text exploring what it means to be a successful woman.

As our own Top Girl, Maree Herrett has never been one to rest with the status quo or to demur from a challenge. Her innovations in curriculum, facilities and educational experiences

are those of a fearless, feisty and unapologetic feminist who has spent a lifetime providing exceptional learning experiences for young people, not least of which was introducing them to a broad range of literature.

As Santa Sabina College Principal from 2013 to 2019 she was appointed with the brief to be an agent of change. The changes she made over seven years have been significant. As a result of her tenure the College has become an authorised International Baccalaureate World School. It has expanded to include a Prep year for four- to five-year-olds, and has been named as the top performing of all Catholic schools (including boys', girls', co-ed, systemic and independent) in the NSW HSC.

Dr Herrett has initiated and overseen a change of uniform and school colours, upgraded several academic departments especially music and sport, shone a spotlight on student academic endeavours through the return of Speech Night and the creation of Speech Day and initiated innovative and far-reaching academic partnerships with universities and industry. Her championship of the STEAM subject areas of Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics have seen these areas of the school flourish and our programs, students and teachers adorned with state and national awards. The refurbishment of the Siena Centre including the addition of the amphitheatre and establishment of the St Catherine's Centre for the senior students are also school improvements achieved in the Herrett era.

Professional development for staff has also come into focus in the Herrett years. Each fortnight in term time all teachers have an hour of targeted professional learning and many attend or present at local and national conferences. Promotion of the annual Board Teacher's Scholarship for a teacher to undertake specific study overseas that aligns with the College's mission,













values and strategic direction is another achievement made possible during the stewardship of Dr Herrett.

A Santa girl since childhood, Dr Herrett is the third College Principal not only to have attended the College but also to have achieved the rank of head girl in her final year. She is the only Santa Principal also to have been a College parent. As a Santa student Dr Herrett was engaged, bright and sometimes naughty. She would challenge the nuns and sometimes buck the system but made lifelong friends whom she still sees today. She was known and continues to be known for diligence and drive as well as a wicked sense of humour and her Dominican passion for learning.

In the intervening years between schoolgirl and College Principal, Dr Herrett held the appointments at Santa Sabina of Coordinator of Senior English and Director of Curriculum. She also taught English at other schools where she held leadership positions including Head of Senior School at MLC Sydney.

According to her long-time friend, our Head of Professional Learning Julie Kadir, her singular characteristic is her adherence to her feminist perspective. 'She looks at everything through a feminist lens – to her it is a matter of justice'.

A model for lifelong learning, Dr Herrett was awarded a Bachelor of Arts degree majoring in English, Politics and Modern History, a Graduate









Diploma of Education from the University of Sydney, an MA in Creative Writing from the University of Western Sydney and a PhD in Education from the University of Sydney with a focus on Gender Equity Policy and Practice in Australian Education. She has been an advocate for gender equality throughout her 40 year teaching career. In 2010 she was presented with the ACEL NSW Leadership Award, and admitted to the rank of Fellow of the NSW Branch of Australian Council for Educational Leaders.

As an author, her published work includes a short story, school textbooks, literary articles and academic publications. And, on top of all this, she is the mother of three and the grandmother of six. She is a role model for all women of what can be achieved with determination and passion, intellect and curiosity.

Above all, resetting the students of Santa Sabina as top girls and boys has been Dr Herrett's priority and her achievement over the last seven years. She will be missed but her exceptional legacy will remain for our benefit.

## OUR 125TH ANNVERSARY

In 2019 the entire Santa community – students, families, staff, ex-students and Dominican sisters – celebrated 125 years of exceptional education at Santa Sabina College.

To commemorate our rich heritage, traditions and success a series of 125th Anniversary events, merchandise and initiatives featured across the year showcasing every campus, involving every department and association, and engaging the entire community – both past and present.

We celebrated our community spirit through four major events, beginning with our 125th Anniversary Mass on 5 February at St Mary's Cathedral Sydney, presided over by Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP. The audience at our Anniversary Concert on 14 June in the Sydney Town Hall was delighted by our exceptional musical talent and the world premières of five new commissions by leading contemporary composers. In Term 3, in August, 1500 attended a special St Dominic's Day and 400 parents, alumni, staff and sisters gathered at the spectacular Westin Hotel Sydney for our 125th anniversary Gala Dinner, raising funds for future generations of Santa girls and boys. And in November, our final major event of the Anniversary year - the Anniversary Fair - took place on our main campus in Strathfield.

Anniversary lapel pins were distributed to all students and staff and anniversary jerseys were proudly worn by those who had purchased them. A commemorative book, *Weaving the Golden Thread through 125 Stories*, was published as a significant and lasting memento of our 125 years. On Harmony Day the students and staff from youngest to oldest gathered on the oval in 125 formation – the maths behind which was calculated by Year 6, their calculations winning both the Mathematical Association of NSW Inc (MANSW) Investigating with Mathematics competition and the national Maths Talent Quest.

On St Dominic's Day the time capsule buried 25 years ago was opened and a new time capsule was buried for our 150th. Year 11 Drama students created an immersive drama experience – The stories they left behind – dramatising life at Santa since 1894 and the Santa Sabina Chapel was adorned with icons for the first time – of St Dominic and St Catherine of Siena, written by Australia's foremost iconographer Michael Galovic and commissioned by the College and the Dominican sisters.








































### WEAVING THE GOLDEN THREAD THROUGH 125 STORIES

The 125th Anniversary of Santa Sabina College is an occasion of great celebration and deep appreciation. The multipurpose garden, part of Siena Centre Stage 3, completes the landscaping around the Santa Sabina College Hall. It will include a pillar naming supporters.



#### STORIES THEY LEFT BEHIND


In a highlight event celebrating our 125th Anniversary, Year 11 Drama students re-created Santa Sabina of the past over two nights on 16 and 17 May 2019 – an immersive theatre performance entitled *The stories they left behind*.

Audience members became immersed in dormitory gossip in the actual bedrooms of earlier years, witnessed early discussions of our founding sisters, got crafty making crowns for St Dominic and gained a new understanding of daily life at Santa in 1894.



#### TIME CAPSULE

In 1994 our Centenary was marked with the burial of a time capsule by Mrs Susan Howland's Year 9 History Class. On St Dominic's Day 2019 Mrs Howland and two of those students – Amelia McAllen (Smyth 1997) and Alice Hickey (Walsh 1997) opened it and revealed examples of student work, publications, photos, audio recordings, videos and floppy disks. We buried our new time capsule in the same position. Without giving away any surprises for our 150th Anniversary it contains mementoes of our 125th Anniversary year, and 'essential' items of interest to the school students of 2019.



- Our concept and vision were to align our efforts and activism this year to one important justice issue.
- The Justice Journey 125 followed the Salamanca process, thereby allowing us to follow in the footsteps of past Dominicans.
- The Salamanca process is about praxis, where action comes out of learning.
- Our Justice Journey 125 was about reading and responding to the signs of the times and incorporating the voices of many.
- The framework uses The Catholic Social Teaching Principles.



After consulting with the students our plastic crusade emerged as our important justice issue for 2019. We have all seen photos of the massive plastic rubbish dumps, the pictures of the great pacific garbage patch and the turtles strangled by plastic. We can all take action and the world has taken action. We have seen huge cities and even countries ban single use plastic and countries have dedicated large sums of money to cleaning up our pollution. Even in Australia the simple change in habit we have all undergone in using reusable bags for our grocery shopping has reduced single use plastic bags by 80%.

At Santa Sabina the Environment Committee achieved some wonderful outcomes. The canteen transitioned from the provision of plastic straws to paper straws and plastic cutlery to bamboo cutlery. The students have been encouraging everyone to bring their own utensils, cups, cutlery and containers to school.

We installed a new soft plastics recycling bin next to the canteen. This will add to our already impressive suite of recycling including co-mingled recycling, paper and cardboard recycling, return and earn bins and compost bins. At Mary Bailey House and Del Monte, students have started to recycle plastic bottle caps that will be eventually recycled for use in making prosthetic limbs for children around the world.

In August we hosted Catholic Earthcare's eco-summit for students from around Sydney to collaborate on important environmental solutions with many other students from other Catholic schools.

The Santa Sabina Foundation supports the College and our community through the receipt of donations that help deliver resources and opportunities for students. It does this through the management of tax deductable recipient funds that are targeted to the needs of the students and the College. I feel proud of the accomplishments we have been able to achieve this last year.

Our Annual Appeal is an opportunity for the entire Santa Sabina Community to support a particular project or fund.

For 2019 the key campaign through the Building Fund was for the refurbishment of the Large Ensemble Room (LER) adjacent to St Dominic's Plot. This space has a rich and varied history. as the staff room and originally as the College's second chapel. I am pleased to announce that the repurposing of the LER into a fit-for-purpose large music and performance space bringing back some of the heritage features as a chapel will commence with the start of the Stage 3 Siena Centre work in late 2019. This undertaking is only possible due to the generosity of our donors who contributed \$9700 to the Annual Appeal Building

Annual Appeal donations to the Scholarship Fund amounted to \$50,960 - this money will directly impact opportunities and

outcomes for a range of students on part or full scholarships. This isn't just a dollar figure – this is a life-changing gift.

We very gratefully acknowledge Maura and Hilary Wilcox and their ongoing contributions to the Arnold and Dorothy Wilcox Scholarship which provides a Santa Sabina education to a student who otherwise may not benefit from all that is on offer

I also acknowledge the \$2450 kindly donated to the Library Fund. This will go towards resources and technology for students, assisting the College to stay at the forefront of

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





#### SANTA SABINA GENERATIONS

Veritas. Truth. Nothing beats it. No complex, obscure words clunking into each other as they run around a crest. Strong, purposeful, direct and easy to interpret. Once you know its meaning, you never forget it.

I've taken this motto literally all my life, so I can proudly say the Dominicans formed me, first at my little parish school St Martha's, Strathfield, and then at Santa Sabina.

I left school to become a journalist. Veritas is the ideal dictum for a journalist to live by. Accuracy in reporting has been the key goal of every news agency I've ever worked for.

I was the third generation of my mother's family to attend Santa Sabina. My grandmother, her only sister, my mother, her two sisters, my cousins, my twin sister Cecilia and our youngest sister Deborah all attended. We all loved it.

My grandmother, Irene Priora, was the little Italian girl who was allowed to bring a tiny quaff of wine to school at lunchtime because that's what her people did. When she was at school in the late 1890s, the nuns kept cows in the back paddocks.

My mother, Jeanette McEgan, told me a story about cutting that tempting corner, walking over St Dom's Plot, only to find Sr Alphonse Marie standing there. Sister ordered her to kneel and say a decade of the Rosary, on the spot. Many years later Sr Alphonse, my brilliant and beloved English teacher, caught me doing exactly the same thing and meted out exactly the same punishment. But even as I knelt down, I was thinking what a good story this would make – and I could see Sr Alphonse suppressing a laugh.

I started my career with the *Sydney Morning Herald*. I've worked for other news publications and agencies as well, but took time out from journalism to work for the Catholic aid and development agency Caritas Australia, where I could put my social justice values into more direct action.

When Mum died seven years ago my life changed. I sat by her bed in the weeks before. I'd always been a medical writer, searching out those stories which empower people by demystifying medicine and science. But as Mum's dying progressed, I realised that I knew nothing about this most fundamental of subjects and that our culture has lost the art of talking about it.

This means certain basic truths have been lost and as a consequence we have become disempowered and frightened. This is particularly so for the families of the dying. So I wrote my book A Good Death: a compassionate and practical guide to prepare for the end of life about this experience that everyone of us will have, yet which is hidden in plain sight.

I don't want to romanticise death but to want to die well is the flip side of wanting

to live well – to work towards dying in a better way is to learn to live in a better way and this is the message I want to share.

Cecilia and Deborah say they were also influenced by the Dominicans. Cecilia studied law and is now Director of Dispute Resolution at the Office of the Australian Information Commissioner. In 2009 her book *Always Liza to Me*, about our sister Elizabeth, who lives with a disability, was published.

'Looking back, I see not only a collection of teachers sharing their gifts, but a collective of women who taught us how to be independent and to call on the truth,' says Cecilia.

Deborah started her career as a journalist with the ABC and is now the Communications and Marketing Manager for the eSafety Commissioner.

'Santa Sabina's support for social justice reinforced my family's own belief in compassion and action, and in going beyond your comfort zone to understand and help others who have not had the same opportunities in life,' says Deborah.

#### Celebrating 125 years of Santa Sabina across four generations

Standing in the middle of the Santa Sabina College courtyard, next to the statue of Saint Dominic, and turning clockwise, the school's 125 year history is clearly visible.

From a grand brick building, constructed in 1894 when the school was founded by seven Dominican Sisters and attended by seven day students, to a lecture theatre and library built in the the early 2000s, with decades in between.

But Santa Sabina's history is also visible through the families who now extend more than four generations.

Dozens of Weavers, Middletons and Mathesons have walked through the gates.

In one family line, top-down from matriarch Helen Weaver, class of 1950, is her daughter-in-law Kerry Weaver, class of 1977, her granddaughter Rachael Middleton, class of 2001, and her greatgranddaughter Emmaline Middleton, class of 2024.

Elizabeth Matheson (daughter of Helen Weaver), class of 1993 and Elizabeth's daughter Annabelle Matheson, class of 2019 also carry the school torch. And it expands outwards from there.

A lot of things have changed about Santa Sabina and Strathfield over four generations, but they all agree that the ethos of the school has stayed the same, along with their passion for field hockey. Kerry Weaver, one of five sisters to attend the school, said: 'The school is bigger but the core values are still the same.'

'The Dominican ethos was very forward thinking and gives you a really rounded education. It wasn't just about learning stuff out of a book, it was learning about life in general.'

When Mrs Weaver finished school in 1977, she said many of the girls' schools were encouraging their students to be either teachers or nurses.

'(But) the school made it clear that it wasn't your only choice. It encouraged girls to look further afield and follow their dreams ... So a lot of students were very much ahead of their time.'

Of growing up in Strathfield, she said: 'It was much smaller, there were no high rises, and everybody knew everybody,' she said.

'I'm one of nine. So there was always somebody, in the year above or below that I knew. Even now, you meet people and you know that their brother went to school with your brother or something like that.'

Mrs Weaver is still best friends with one of her school mates. They were bridesmaids at each other's weddings and godparents to each other's children.

Mrs Weaver reminisces about taking her daughter Rachael to school on the first day of Year 7.

'I remember the first time we came up the stairs ... and feeling like I was back in Year 11 going up the stairs for a prefect meeting.'

She now makes sure to attend every Grandparents Day at the school.

Her daughter Rachael Middleton, who lives in Concord, will put her four daughters and her son through Santa Sabina College.

'The school helps everyone work out who they are and what they want to be,' she said.

Mrs Middleton fondly remembers the school's outdoor education program helping her come out of her shell.

Her cousin, Year 12 student Annabelle Matheson, said: 'Before I attended, I always heard stories from mum, aunties and grandma, about just how fun the school was. I'm hoping that all my friendships here are continued.'

Like her older female relatives, she pinpointed the social justice program as a massive drawcard.

'They tell us we are the future ambassadors for the world so it lifts up our confidence, because it shows us that we can make a change in the world if we want to ... We get to see how the world is different to us and we get to see how other people live and it kind of makes you want to change.'

Santa Sabina College marked their 125th anniversary with a Mass, with further celebrations planned throughout the vear.

College Principal Dr Maree Herrett said: 'This year we particularly celebrate and give thanks for the sacrifices and achievements of our founding Sisters of the Dominican Order and for all the staff and students who have passed through the gates at 90 The Boulevarde.'

## A very Santa friendship story Connie and Peggy

My mum, Connie Allan (Wright 1939), was best friends with Peggy (Grace Margaret Conaghan 1939) for over 80 years.

Where did they meet? Santa Sabina! They were both boarders there and met in 1st or 2nd Form.

A friendship that started at school, lasted through the war years when they lived together and beyond – a wonderful friendship.

Peg was born in 1921 in Rockhampton and died in February last year in Yeppoon, aged 96. Mum was devastated when Peggy died and died herself just a few months later, at 97 years old. Although they spent many years living in different states they were very, very close.

They came back to Santa for the centenary celebrations in 1994. They always talked fondly of their time at boarding school and spoke of one particular nun whom they really loved (I am sorry I can't remember her name).

I hope the girls going through today manage to make lifetime friendships which really do last a lifetime, which mum and Pegs truly was. As Peggy was from Rockhampton and Mum from Leeton it was easier for Peggy to spend the school holidays with Mum and her family. So they would go yabbying in the dams and have picnics with the Leeton gang. I got the impression that neither of them were particularly studious and they use to joke about how 'not smart' they were. But they were both very smart women!



After school and during the war years they lived together in Adams Street, South Yarra, Victoria. They dated guys from America here during the war time. Peggy joined up and was in the women's auxiliary, Mum went to work in the munitions lab where she met Dad.

Peggy went on to work for the UN in New York and they corresponded for the next few years. When Peggy returned she went home to live in Rockhampton. She wound up owning pubs, in Rocky and Yeppoon (her father was a publican) and she lived in Yeppoon most of the rest of her life.

She would always visit us either in Melbourne when we lived there and then in Sydney when we moved up and when I was 18 I went to live with her for a while!

As they got older it was harder for them to do the trip to see each other, so I made sure I took mum to Brisbane to catch up with Peggy, or went myself as often as I could.

I think the thing that showed how wonderful their friendship was, was that as Peggy lay on her bed in the hospital, a friend of hers rang mum. Sandy put the phone to Peggy's ear, and Mum told Peg how much she loved her and how much their friendship had meant to her over the years and apparently Peggy smiled. Sandy hung up the phone and Peg passed away.

Mum passed away not long after... they use to joke about how it was just the two of them left (and it seriously was at 96 and 97 years old)!
